### Terrific: SRSA 40th Celebration in Austin

The Association commemorated four decades of service to regional science in the south last month in Austin, Texas. The Driskill Hotel in downtown Austin site for the 2001 annual meeting proved to be an ideal

location for this historic occasion. Thirteen past presidents were in attendance from Bill Schaffer, the second president of the SRSA, to Judy Stallmann, the immediate past president and local arrangements chair for the meeting. Frank Hefner, program chair for 2001, put together a program that was worthy of SRSA's forty years of endeavors in regional science.

Three sessions drew on the expertise ten of the past presidents in attendance. These sessions provoked lively discussion and gave those in attendance much to take home on such topics as "Issues in Regional Science", "Looking for Discipline in Regional Science", and "Taking Theory to Practice."

At the business meeting on Saturday, the following officers were elected: President elect and program chair for 2003, Robert Gibbs, US Department of Agriculture; Councilors for 2001 to 2004, Ed Feser, UNC, Chapel Hill and Scott Loveridge, Michigan State. John Kort, BEA, was reappointed by the Executive Council as SRSA representative to NARSC for a two year term.

The Graduate Paper Committee selected as the winner of the 2001 Barry M. Moriarty Award Xie Qingshu, George mason University. The title of his paper was: "Spatial Income Inequalities and Regional Economic Growth in China: An Empirical Analysis."

John Rees gave an inspiring Presidential Address, "Landscapes of Liberty." He included a slide show of people and places, a recitation of poetry, and clear and convincing evidence for why Welch is impossible to comprehend! I would like to remind all of the presenters to consider submitting their papers for consideration for publication in the *Review*.

As program chair, I would like to thank all of the participants. We had 33 very interesting sessions. One participant, new to the SRSA, commented to me that the sessions were very productive. When scheduled discussants or presenters inadvertently could not make the conference, (as happens occasionally) the audience took up the slack by providing spirited discussion. The sessions became workshops with a free flow of ideas. I think this spirit of inquiry, energy, and intimacy are what make the SRSA meetings special.

The SRSA has been international and continues to bewe had a number of international scholars presenting. Participants from such Southern locales as New York, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Utah, Minnesota, and North Dakota also attended. The SRSA is national and international in scope and Southern in its hospitality.

Speaking of Southern hospitality- The SRSA is hosting the North American Meetings of the Regional Science Association International in Charleston in November. Yours truly is serving as the program chair. Already several people have indicated an interest in organizing sessions. Ray Rhodes of the S.C. Department of Natural Resources has agreed to organize an oyster roast at the Fort Johnson Marine Center. Fort Johnson is near the entrance to the harbor, a short cannon shot to Fort Sumter. He and I are arranging for transportation from the hotel to Fort Johnson. The conference hotel, the Francis Marion, has undergone a major renovation. The over flow hotel, the Embassy Suites, in the old Citadel building fronting Francis Marion Square, also has undergone a major renovation (both are historical looking with modern conveniences.) In between working on your papers for presentation, you might get a video of the movie, The Patriot starring Mel Gibson. It was filmed in Charleston and includes some excellent footage of historic buildings at the College of Charleston and downtown. The swamp, plantation, and island scenes are also local.
